#### Florida Constitution

### Article II, Section 8

- Financial disclosure
- Campaign finance disclosure
- Liable to the state for all improper financial benefits
- Independent commission to investigate breach of public trust
- Code of Ethics in Florida Law







## 2018 Florida Constitutional Revision Commission

Changes to Article II, Section 8.

- Will prohibit officials from abusing their position to obtain a disproportionate benefit for a business in which they have an interest (effective Dec. 31, 2020)
- Will restrict lobbying by certain officeholders and employees, and put additional limits on lobbying by former public officers and employees (effective Dec. 31, 2022)





# II. ETHICS RULES OF ENGAGEMENT

#### **Prohibited Conduct**



- 1. Solicitation or Acceptance of Gifts
- 2. Solicitation or Acceptance of Honoraria
- 3. Unauthorized Compensation





#### **Prohibited Conduct**



- 4. Misuse of Public Position
- 5. Disclosure or Use of Certain Information





### Conflicts

Doing business with your agency

A public official may not:

- Purchase or sell
- Any realty, goods, or services for or to his or her agency
- From a business entity in which the officer (or his or her spouse or child) owns more than a 5% interest

Section 112.313(3), Florida Statutes







## Conflicting employment or contractual relationship



A public official may not hold any employment or contract with any business or agency:

- regulated by or doing business with his or her public agency
- which will pose a frequently recurring conflict between the official's private interests and public duties or which will impede the full and faithful discharge of the official's public duties
- limited exceptions exist for certain special tax districts, drainage districts, and persons whose professions or occupations qualify them to hold their public positions

Section 112.313(7), Florida Statutes





## Some exemptions from prohibited conflict requirements:

- Sealed competitive bids <u>and</u> the official files a disclosure with the supervisor of elections
- Only source of supply
- The official purchases goods or services in her private capacity from a business regulated by her agency <u>and</u> the price and terms are available to the public <u>and</u> the official makes full disclosure to the governing body before the transaction

## If you think you may have a prohibited conflict




- Ethics compliance is personal to you
- City Attorneys can provide resources and help you get in touch with the Ethics Commission, but cannot represent you personally

## Voting conflicts



A public officer may not vote on any measure which would inure to his or her special private gain or loss

Section 112.3143(3) (a), Florida Statutes





### Voting conflicts

A public officer may not vote on a measure that would inure to the special private gain or loss of any -

- principal by whom he or she is retained
- parent or subsidiary of principal
- relative
- business associate






## **Voting Conflicts**Relatives

- Spouse
- Parent
- Children
- In-laws

## Voting conflicts

"Special private gain or loss"

#### Factors to consider:

- 1. The size of the class affected by the vote.
- 2. The nature of the interests involved. (preliminary or procedural)
- 3. The degree to which all members of the class are affected by the vote.
- 4. The degree to which the officer, relative, business associate, or principal receives a greater benefit or harm when compared to other members of the class.

Section 112.3143(1)(d), Florida Statutes







## **Voting Conflicts**

very fact specific factors:

- size of the affected class
- remote or speculative
- procedural or preliminary







## What to do if you have a voting conflict

- Abstain from voting
- Before vote is taken publicly state the nature of the conflict
- File Form 8B Memorandum of Voting Conflict (within 15 days after vote occurs)

#### WHO MUST FILE FORM 8B

This form is for use by any person serving at the county, city, or other local level of government on an appointed or elected board, council, commission, authority, or committee. It applies to members of advisory and non-advisory bodies who are presented with a voting conflict of interest under Section 112.3143, Florida Statutes.

Your responsibilities under the law when faced with voting on a measure in which you have a conflict of interest will vary greatly depending on whether you hold an elective or appointive position. For this reason, please pay close attention to the instructions on this form before completing and filing the form.

## Post-officeholding restrictions



Former elected local government officers may not represent another person or entity for compensation before the government body or agency of which he or she was an officer for two years after leaving office.

Section 112.313(14), Florida Statutes





## Restrictions on the employment of relatives

A public official may not seek for a relative:

any appointment, employment, promotion, or
advancement in the agency in which he or she
serves or over which he has control



# III. FINANCIAL AND OTHER DISCLOSURE FORMS

## Financial Disclosure



- Must file a statement of financial interests by July 1 each year
- Automatic fines up to \$1,500 after Sept. 1

Sections 112.3145(2)(b), and 112.3144 Florida Statutes





## Financial Disclosure Form 1 What must be disclosed

- Sources and types of financial interests
- Employer names
- Addresses of real property holdings
- NO DOLLAR VALUES ARE REQUIRED TO BE LISTED
- Relationships with, and ownership interests in, businesses such as banks, savings and loans, insurance companies, and utility companies.





## Financial Disclosure forms filed with Supervisor of Elections

Statement of Financial Interests Form 1	By July 1 each year to report for prior calendar year
Amendment to Financial Disclosure Form 1X	Whenever you seek amendment
Final Statement of Financial Interests Form 1F	Within 60 days after leaving office



## IV. PENALTIES

## Non-criminal penalties

#### For a public officer may include:

- Impeachment
- Removal or suspension from office
- Public censure
- Reduction in salary
- Civil penalty not to exceed \$10,000
- Restitution of any pecuniary benefits received

Section 112.317 Florida Statutes





## **Felony Convictions**

#### Forfeiture of Retirement Benefits for:

- Embezzlement or theft of public funds
- Bribery
- Felonies specified in Chapter 838, Florida Statutes
- Impeachable offenses
- Felonies committed with intent to defraud the public

Section 112.3173, Florida Statutes





# ADVISORY OPINIONS AND ETHICS COMPLAINTS

### Ethics complaints

- Any citizen may file a sworn complaint with the Commission on Ethics within 5 years of the breach of public trust (Form 50)
- Proceedings are confidential until they reach a certain stage or the accused requests it to be public
- Complaint is provided to the accused
- Commission conducts investigation
- Commission issues a report and may recommend penalties





## How to request an advisory opinion

- Submit a letter presenting a question based on a real situation and include a detailed description of the situation
- Opinions are limited to a specific written set of facts
- Opinions are binding on the person requesting it
